Class Hours: According to the regulations of Minister of Education, R.O.C, 18 class hours could be counted as 1 academic credit in all universities in Taiwan. This course will have 72 class hours, including 40 lecture hours, professor 10 office hours, 10-hour TA discussion sessions, 2-hour review sessions, 10-hour extra classes.

Course Description:

In this course we will examine the major elements of European experience of the eighteen century through the mid-twentieth century. We will focus not only on the achievements of Western Civilization, but also on the cost of these achievements and the questions that have been raised by groups who feel exploited by or left out of Western Civilization. The course will examine revolutions, nationalism, industrialization, imperialism, World wars, fascism,

communism, and democracy. Other major components consist of the decline of colonialism, the Atomic Age and the Cold War, contemporary world conflicts, as well as prospects for the future. This course will combine classical lectures and discussion sections. Each student will be expected to actively participate in class.

Students will present their comments about the readings in each class. Presentations will be a part of their grade.

- A. history students will have broadened their understanding of the economic, cultural and political forces that created the world in which they live;
- B. students in the scientific and technological areas will be more able to discuss their major subjects in terms of historical development and social impact;
- C. All students will have a better understanding of the stages in maturation of the civilization they call their own Western Civilization;
- D. Students will develop awareness not just of achievements but also of the "underside" of the civilization of the West.
