Required Textbook: The required textbook is *Microeconomics and Behavior, 8th edition* by Robert H. Frank. Published by McGraw Hill Education.

Course Description:

This course is aimed to provide further understanding of neoclassical principles of resource allocation. Topics that will be covered are choice theory, theory of the firm, and theory of market structures, policy applications and formal techniques. Examination of models requires extensive use of mathematical and graphical analysis.

Course Requirements:

Exams: There will be one **midterm exam** and one cumulative **final exam**. All exams may include multiple choice questions and problems along with few short answer questions. Dates of exams are marked on the course calendar section of this syllabus, so mark your calendars.

Homework assignments: There will be 4 homework assignments. The purpose of these assignments is to make sure you stay current with the material. Assignments are due at the *beginning* of a class session, not the end. *So, you should make sure that you email your homework assignment before the class begins*. You are encouraged to work with your classmates but you should submit your own answers to homework. Answers will be posted on the Blackboard. I would like to clearly note that there is a strong correlation between *genuine* effort you put into homework assignments and your grades at the end of the semester. Students are also highly encouraged to work on the multiple choice questions provided in the supplement materials of the textbook!
