This course will have 52 class hours, including 32 lecture hours, professor 8 office hours, 8-hour TA discussion sessions, 4-hour review sessions.

Course Description:

The purpose of this course is to introduce the student to the origins, roles, and consequences of race and ethnicity in contemporary society. The primary content of the course will focus upon race and ethnicity within the United States, but the course will also address global issues related to these subjects. Students will be introduced to a variety of sociological theories, concepts, and research methodologies. Given the inherent interweave of race, ethnicity, and stratification, the course will particularly focus upon the social and individual consequences of stratification. Topics within the course include, but are not limited to: prejudice, discrimination, the role of immigration in racial/ethnic relations, religion, political institutions and race, marriage and family, race and the justice system, identity and self-esteem, educational attainment, and the economic consequences of race/ethnicity, among others. In addition, considerable attention will be focused upon some of the larger racial and ethnic groups in the U.S. The course is intended to provide students with an understanding of race and ethnicity, and also how it can be viewed through a sociological perspective.

Course Objectives:

The primary objectives for this course are:

- To gain an understanding of race/ethnicity from a sociological perspective
- To become familiar with a variety of racial and ethnic experiences within the United States



- To critically examine the theoretical and empirical approaches used to study race and ethnicity, and its relationship to social inequality
- To identify some of the major debates that have dominated the study of race and ethnicity in the U.S. Sociology
- To examine and comprehend how racial and ethnic relations change over time
