Course Descriptions:

The course is an online class. Because this is a language course, students will need to listen and talk to the instructor through synchronous classes, that is real-time online classes. Students must have access to a computer and high-speed internet, a microphone, and a camera for downloading the lecture materials and homework sheets, uploading the assignments, listening to the lecture, speaking to the instructor, and taking the quizzes and exam.

This course is designed for students who have never taken a formal Japanese language class. The goal of this course is for students to develop a foundation of the Japanese language to acquire minimum communicative skills. Students will learn how to read and write in Hiragana and Katakana. This course is not for those who have studied basic Japanese including Hiragana, Katakana, past tense verb conjugation, adjective conjugation, and Te-form. By the end of this summer session, students will be able to read and write the following sentences. If you can easily understand these sentences, this is not the right course for you.

Course Outline:

The normal face-to face summer class has 7.5 contact hours per week over five weeks. For this class, each student will have one-hour synchronous online classes 4 times per week. In addition to this, it is expected that students spend average 4 hours per week outside of synchronous class to work on the provided materials. Homework will be assigned on every topic. Based on all parameters, students spend minimum 35 to 45 hours over five weeks to understand the materials. Time and other details about the synchronous online classes will be determined later depending on the number of registered students. Forming multiple smaller groups is expected.
