

## INTRODUCTION TO SPEECH COMMUNICATION Summer 2021

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<u>Course Description</u>: This course provides students with theoretical knowledge and practical experience in communicating interpersonally, working in groups and teams, and speaking in public spaces. We combine an understanding of the theories and research on communication with the development of practical skills. We will explore the ways to analyze the range of ways in which people communicate, in an effort to also improve our own skills in communicating with a variety of people. A primary focus in this course is on analyzing audiences, listening, speaking effectively, managing conflict in teams and in our personal relationships, and in applying skills and strategies to enter into civic engagement and improving our communities.

<u>Learning Outcomes</u>: If you successfully participate in the class, you will be able to:

- Recognize core concepts and theories of public, interpersonal, and small group communication.
- Apply theories and skills to communicate competently in a variety of contexts, with diverse audiences.
- Analyze and evaluate the oral and written messages and arguments of others.
- Construct and communicate effective arguments to diverse audiences in oral and written forms.
- Demonstrate ethical communication when constructing arguments, interpreting messages, and communicating with others.
- Use research to describe how groups and individuals interact with their communities to influence modern issues in civic life.
