#### **Course Information**

History 102 will survey the periods in history generally referred to as the Middle Ages and the early modern era, which, in this class, encompass roughly the eleventh through the seventeenth centuries (1000CE to 1700 or so). We will explore the ideas, systems, and conflicts that defined these centuries around the world. Our overarching goal is to learn about this past to make better sense of the present.

## Outcomes (what you'll be able to do after taking this class)

After completing this class, students should be able to:

- View current news and world events in new ways
- Analyze and critically evaluate primary and secondary sources
- Write with greater clarity and precision
- Identify and assess the causes and consequences of the major economic, social, political, religious, and cultural developments in world history.
- Identify and understand various types of art produced during the Middle Ages and early modern period

## **Syllabus Quiz**

Mandatory. The syllabus quiz is due **Sunday, September 27** at 11:59 p.m. You get multiple chances to get the answers right, so make sure you take time to learn about our class and get some easy points!

## **Discussions**

There are 11 total discussions. They are due on Thursdays at 11:59 p.m. and they are 25 points each. There are two parts to each discussion:

- 1. The source materials you need to analyze to write your initial post (20 points)
- 2. A response to a classmate's post (5 points) (sometimes 1 response, sometimes 2)

You will need to complete **9 discussions out of 11**. All students must complete Discussion 1 (introduce yourself to the class). I suggest planning accordingly. That means looking at your schedule and figuring out when you have other things due in other classes and could use a break from this class. Or, skip two discussions that don't appear to interest you as much as the others. **No late discussion submissions.** 

## **Essays**

There are **2 essays**. Detailed instructions will be available in Canvas. These assignments will be submitted online through Canvas and will be subjected to **VeriCite**. More detailed instructions are posted with each essay.
