Course Information

English 235 focuses on the development of professional skills in research, design, and communication of technical information. Emphasis is on audience analysis, clear and effective writing style, and the use of visual elements to create documents in a variety of professional report formats, such as memos, proposals, progress reports, completion reports, and instruction manuals. Also, because it is sustainability, CECE, and project focused, you will read, analyze, and discuss selections related to climate change and complete a group CECE project to improve sustainable practices in your community.

Course Outcomes

After completing this class, students should be able to:

- Write documents such as summaries, instruction manuals, analyses, proposals, and research reports, using accepted professional formats
- Design a research strategy to solve a specific problem for a specific client
- Conduct secondary and primary research
- Propose a clearly reasoned, convincingly supported solution to a client's problem
- Paraphrase, summarize, and quote information with integrity and document sources accurately, following the accepted form for the field of inquiry
- Design visually effective documents and presentations
- Practice the Writing Process - revise and edit to improve clarity, economy, and rhetorical effectiveness

- Sustainability Focused Outcomes

- Apply understanding of the effect of the current use of earth by humans in the context of environmental stresses such as pollution, global warming, habitat loss, etc.
- Explain how sustainable thinking and decision-making contribute to solutions for current and emerging social, environmental and economic crises.
- Present manufacturing and service operation strategies that promote sustainable development in local, regional and global environments.

How Outcomes Will be Met

Classwork: *Check Canvas daily for assignments.* Prepare your classwork before the due date and be ready to turn it in or discuss it on the due date. Including assignments, readings, discussions, and projects, you should expect to spend **10-15 hours each week** for this 5 credit class. The more effort and time you put into this class, the more you will learn and get out of it.

Participation: Participation means logging into Canvas regularly, reading the texts, participating in group work, completing assignments, and asking and answering questions. You are responsible for your learning, and I expect you to actively participate in every aspect of the class, Canvas, the assignments, and the textbooks.

Online Literature Circles: Literature Circles are a weekly online synchronous group activity and all students are expected to participate. Literature circles are meant to help you analyze, think critically about, and discuss the assigned readings related to climate change.

Technical Document Writing Assignments: You will do several technical document writing assignments throughout the quarter to give you an opportunity to practice the Writing Process. Through reading the textbook, you will learn about different types of technical writing and then create writing or report samples based on topics related to your group project or provided by me.

CECE Sustainability Group Project: You will work with 1-2 other students on a quarter-long CECE and sustainability-focused project. You will identify and work to help improve sustainable practices in a place of your choice and present your ideas to the people in power to make this change. Throughout this quarter-long group project, you will use the technical writing skills you have learned and apply them to real-world situations to have a positive impact on the community.

Grading Policies

Your grade will depend on the quality of your work, your effort, and how you apply what you have learned. Points may be subtracted for assignments turned in late.
