

CLASS TASKS Purpose: Play around and develop an understanding of the new material.	20%	 Class Tasks (CT) on your textbook site (vhl) give you first exposure to new concepts. They compare to what we would have done in class had we met face-to-face. They include: tutorials, power points and a variety of written and spoken practice exercises. "Discussion Board" assignments on diverse topics are posted on Canvas. You are required to check Canvas daily, post your answers as well as reply meaningfully to one of your classmates. Max. attempts: 2 Accents, punctuation and capitalization count. Class Tasks are scheduled daily on vhl. The cumulative grade for each lesson is recorded the night before the respective lesson test. Find the cumulative deadlines on your canvas page.
HOMEWORK Purpose: To deepen the understanding of the new material.	30%	 Daily practice (HW) of what was learned via a variety of practice exercises on vhl. Supplementary practice and resources are posted on canvas. Max. attempts: 2 Accents, punctuation and capitalization count. Homework exercises are scheduled daily on vhl, The cumulative grade for each lesson is recorded the night before the respective lesson test. Find the cumulative deadlines on your canvas page.
QUIZZES Purpose: To showcase the new vocabulary and grammar in small sections.	20%	 Four lessons are covered during the quarter. Each lesson has 2 vocabulary and 2 grammar quizzes. Tests cover all grammatical structures and new words you have learned in each lesson. Max. attempts: 1 Accents, punctuation and capitalization count. Quizzes are due on the dates posted on canvas' home page and your vhl textbook site.
TESTS & PERFORMANCE Purpose: To showcase speaking, listening, writing and reading French. One of the lowest ass	30%	 Each lesson has 2 tests as well as several performance tasks (speaking and writing). Incompletes

Much of a language class is consistency and quantity of time spent on the material covered which includes a lot of speaking practice. Outlined in the Bellevue College grading <u>policy</u>, incompletes can only be granted under very specific circumstances:

Anti-Bias in the Classroom

- Any act of academic dishonesty, including cheating, plagiarism (using the ideas or words of another as one's own without crediting the source), and fabrication and inappropriate/disruptive classroom behavior are violations of the Student Code of Conduct at Bellevue College.
- Examples of unacceptable behavior include, but are not limited to, talking out of turn, allowing cell phones/pagers to ring, and inappropriate behavior toward the instructor or classmates.

Academic Dishonesty

Academic dishonesty includes, but is not limited to, cheating, plagiarism, and fabrication and may result in one or more of the following: a student receiving a failing grade on the assignment, a failing grade for the course, or suspension from college enrollment.

• **Cheating** includes any attempt to give or obtain unauthorized assistance relating to the completion of an academic assignment.

- **Plagiarism** is the conscious or inadvertent failure to identify the contributions of others. It occurs when someone borrows any part of another's work and submits it as his or her own work without giving credit to the original author.
- **Fabrication** includes falsifying data, information, or citations in completing an academic assignment and also includes providing false or deceptive information to an instructor concerning the completion of an assignment.
- **Multiple submissions** include submitting the same work in separate courses without the express permission of the instructor(s).
- **Deliberate damage** is taking deliberate action to destroy or damage another's academic work or college property in order to gain an advantage for oneself or another.

Examples which may be considered plagiarism and can result in the consequences listed above:

- When you are doing a research project on the Web and you cut and paste the text without saying where you got it.
- When you copy directly out of a book without naming the book and the author.
- If your answers are very similar to other students on an exam.
- If you have someone else complete your homework for you, or if you turn in a homework assignment and your answers are very similar to another student's, this may be considered plagiarism and may result in the consequences listed above.

- 1) Take directions from those in charge of the response -We all need to be working together.
- 2) Do not get in your car and leave campus (unless directed to) Doing so will clog streets and prevent emergency vehicles from entering the scene. Instead, follow directions from those in charge.
