Course Information

This quarter, we will deal specifically with fiction writing techniques for popular or genre fiction. Genre fiction includes fantasy, horror, mystery, romance, science fiction, vampire, and western along with their many subgenres. Whether you are experienced with writing genre fiction or merely trying it out for the first time, you will find help in this class. Also, note—the old days of distinct genres are long gone. In today's genre fiction, you will very often find mixtures of at least two, and often more, genres. So, don't

despair if your mystery ends up having horror and fantasy aspects or vice versa.

Course Outcomes

According to the English department at Bellevue College, after completing this course, students will be able to:

- Distinguish between plot and story
- Create believable characters through description, action, scene, and dialogue
- Develop scenes
- · Establish and sustain a point of view
- Create and sustain tension
- Show, rather than tell, by using specific details, naming nouns and strong, active verbs
- Control sentence structure, length, and word choice to create a particular tone and mood
- Critique, revise and edit works in progress

How Course Outcomes will be met

Over the course of the quarter, you will complete the following assignments to develop your fiction writing skills:

- Read instructional material on character, plot, story, scenes, dialogue, point of view, and setting from our class website and apply this instructional material to homework assignments.
- Participate in weekly class discussions to develop and share your understanding of these elements of fiction [character, plot, story, dialogue, point of view, and setting] as seen in the readings.
- Write a short scene, mainly in dialogue, in an assigned setting.
- Write a vignette from your choice of assigned photographs. [*A vignette is a short, descriptive scene.]

- Write, revise and edit one (1) original short story or a first novel chapter [not a prologue].
- Participate in Feedback Workshops to improve your ability to critique the work of others and revise your work.

Late Policy:

Assignments submitted after the due date listed on the course calendar will lose 10% of their total points per 24-hour period that they are late. I will not accept late assignments if they arrive *more than 96 hours* after the original due date without prior approval. Rubrics are also provided for Scene, Vignette, Homework, and Short Story assignments. My goal is always to return your writing assignments within 5 working days of their submission.

**Important Note: I grade the scene, vignette, and short story assignments according to their length. If your writing assignment, whatever kind it is, exceeds the length requirement stated in the assignment, I will grade it after I have graded the assignments that meet the length requirements. Submitting a longer than required length assignment nay substantially delay the return of your assignment, depending on how many assignments I get that are long.

<u>I grade all late assignments last</u>. Depending on how late they are, I may not get them back within the time allotments stated above.

Virtual Classroom Learning Atmosphere

This class is an asynchronous learning class; therefore, you are required to attend electronic class sessions. I recommend "attending" class at least 5 days a week. In this class, I have created a path—using learning modules and the course calendar—to guide students through the course on time. While you have some flexibility in choosing when to do your work, you will have deadlines for submitting that work.

Instructor's Expectations

- 1. I expect that you will participate in all class activities, whether individually or in groups, as assigned on the class calendar, instructional pages, and the syllabus.
- 2. I expect that you come to this class with some basic college-level skills, such as
 - A. the ability to read, to comprehend, and to follow clear written instructions,
 - B. the ability to ask questions if you are confused or are having problems with the technology,

- C. the ability to attach and download files as well as follow links on Canvas, and
- D. the ability to write using the standard conventions of modern English grammar and mechanics.
- 3. Furthermore, in this class, I expect that you will
 - A. "attend" class at least 5 days each week,
 - B. participate in ALL class activities, (**see note below)
 - C. be responsible to save and backup your assignment files, and
 - D. always be courteous and respectful to everyone in the class.

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- **Every quarter someone who has failed to participate fully asks me for an incomplete or an extra credit assignment. Here are my policies in these areas:
- (1) <u>Incomplete (I) grades</u>: I give an incomplete in the following situations. First, the student has completed 80% of the coursework, and second, the student has a verifiable medical or family emergency that prevents him/her from completing the coursework on time.
- (2) Extra credit Assignments: I do not assign extra credit to individuals, though I may offer it to the entire class for certain activities.
