Course Outcomes

After completing this class, students should be able to:

- Identify standard human-computer interfaces using industry standard terminology.
- Describe network components of computers and associated storage systems.
- Effectively search the Internet and use information to create a basic html web page.
- Describe similarities and differences between binary and decimal systems.
- Provide a descriptive algorithm for solving a problem.
- Identify digital versus analog representations of pictures and sounds.
- Identify and explain common spreadsheet functions and capabilities.
- Identify and explain common database management functions and capabilities
- Explain what a program is, and how a program is produced.

How Outcomes Will Be Met

OK, so you have likely been using a computer and some sort of technology for much of your life . . . we are surrounded by technology, from ATM machines to credit card terminals; laptops, tablets and smartphones to car navigation systems. The medical community is always getting new equipment to do amazing things while our armed forces use satellites and unmanned airplanes around the globe. This class will give you a look under the hood at how these technologies work and hopefully give students a better understanding of how to choose technology products and how to better use technology in your careers. We have a combination of readings, labs, quizzes, videos and lectures to help students reach the course outcomes. For some of you, this will be enough! Others will choose to take additional CS courses and even move on to careers in technology. Either way - enjoy the course!

Required Textbook & Software

We are not using a textbook for this course. However, students are expected to have a recent version of Microsoft Office (either installed on your personal computer, or available on a computer you may use throughout the quarter). Please note that Bellevue College computer labs have the latest versions of Microsoft Office installed for students to use.

Learning Atmosphere / Course Structure and Expectations

Online courses differ from traditional classroom courses in that we lack visual real-time communication but benefit from a slightly more flexible schedule. To ensure successfully achieving the goals of this course, we use several teaching/learning methods:

- Quizzes
- Online Presentations and/or links to resources
- Labs and Assignments

My role as the instructor is to:

- Help students succeed in this course;
- Share my knowledge and experiences to help expand on concepts discussed in the course;
- Provide timely feedback to students;
- Moderate discussions and challenge students to further their knowledge; and
- Evaluate and grade students.

As a student in this course, I expect you to:

- Work hard to achieve the goals of the course;
- Actively contribute to any discussions;
- Share your thoughts, knowledge and experiences;
- Cooperate and collaborate with other students; and
- Provide feedback to me throughout the course.

While online courses can be more convenient than traditional classroom courses, they are not “easier”. To be successful, you must participate regularly and spend significant time studying. I can tell you from experience (having previously taken online courses) that it takes discipline, patience and thoughtful planning to be successful. That said, the true benefit of the online portion of this course is a more flexible schedule; something that can be quite beneficial to those that have other responsibilities during the typical classroom course times. Should you struggle with time management or study habits during the quarter, please don't hesitate to contact me. The sooner we can address the problem, the easier it will be to achieve your goals for the course!

Course Schedule

Our Canvas site is broken up into five modules. Each module will become available on a Sunday and last 1 to 2 weeks. Each module contains groupings of reading, resources, assignments and quizzes. Make sure you are checking into our Canvas site daily and pay close attention to due dates!

It is extremely important that students do not fall behind, as we move rapidly and it can be tough to catch up. However, I also don't want students getting too far ahead, as it is important to pace ourselves.

Assignments, Quizzes and Labs are due on Saturdays by 11:59 PM.

Quizzes

There will be several quizzes contained within each module. Quizzes are timed at 60 minutes; that timer is just meant to encourage you to work on studying, browsing, and doing homework in advance. Of course, you can also search online for answers during a Quiz, but that time is limited, so you must know something about the material in advance. There is no timer on other posted items and links, so study those as needed first.

Assignments / Labs

No timer on these, but they **DO** have a deadline, so you need to work on them in advance as they become available. I must download, review, process, and score each one individually, so due dates are strictly enforced. I try to keep the class moving along together, so current Discussions and Announcements will be relevant for all, thus future Modules (and their corresponding assignments, quizzes and resources) are not available right away.

Late Work

Late work will not be accepted unless an arrangement is made and approved **PRIOR** to the due date. Students have adequate notice on all assignment due dates (see “Syllabus” section in Canvas).
