Course Outcomes

Learning Outcomes (what you need to learn from this class):

- 1. Explain existing definitions of sustainability and derive a good working definition of sustainability that includes environmental, economic, and social justice factors.
- 2. Discuss ways to consume less energy in the home, business, and transportation.
- 3. List and explain ways to reduce carbon footprint in personal and professional life.
- 4. Identify and describe ways each person can reduce the toxins we use and emit into the environment and identify and reduce exposure to existing toxins.
- 5. Discuss ways to use or produce, transport, and distribute food more sustainably.
- 6. Discuss sustainability in terms of, global, economic and political factors that may either help or hinder the movement toward a more sustainable global society.
- 7. Discuss how local actions can have a worldwide impact and include positive and negative examples.
- 8. Be able to differentiate between renewable and non-renewable resources, and describe traditional as well as new, more innovative techniques for producing, using and

conserving those resources.

- 9. Describe the concept of social justice as it relates to sustainability
- 10. Demonstrate how to find and synthesize scientific information in print and electronic media.

Instructor's Expectations

Student Responsibilities:

Students are expected to conduct all online interactions in a mature, professional manner. Professional communication should be void of slang terms, emoticons, statements in all caps, or texting abbreviations. When communicating online, students are expected to be as courteous and respectful to others as you would be in person. Emails and online discussion posts cannot be taken back; be mindful not to send emails or make posts that you might later regret. Class Requirements:

Taking classes online is not for everyone. Learning online has both advantages and disadvantages. Some of the most important advantages are the convenience and freedom of being able to "attend class" when it fits your schedule. However, like most

freedoms in life, you must be responsible for being organized and self-motivated in order to succeed. This is a class that requires online participation from each student. It is not a self-paced course, it has very specific assignment deadlines. You are responsible for all material in our class Canvas web site, for the assigned readings, assignments, discussions and exams. This includes any changes is the schedule of assignments. Changes will be announced on our class home page, or by announcements. All assignments and exams are due by the **due date** and time given in the assignment. Some assignments are open after the due date and for these assignments you will get partial credit for late work. In general, late work will not be accepted and will receive no credit. You need to be prepared for technical difficulties. If an assignment does not get turned in on time because of technical difficulties at the last minute, it will be considered late and will not be graded. If you have a question about an assignment and you ask the day its due, it is likely that I won't have time to get back to you before you submit. It is also a good idea to save copies of the files you turn in. All homework assignments are open from the start of the quarter and may be turned in early.

Get notifications for announcements

Once you log in to Canvas you can select "Account" under the BC logo, then select "settings". Next, click on "ways to contact", on the right of the page, add your email and cell phone number. Go back to "Account" and select the notifications tab on the left-hand side, find "Announcements" in the list, and set your notification preference to "Notify Me Right Away" (select the check mark under the email address column). You can also select to have grades sent to you as I post them, but this is optional.

Time:

You will need to dedicate at least 15 hours to this class per week for best results. While this is an online class you are expected to spend the same amount of time as if you took this class on campus. Five hours a week to read the textbook. Ten hours a week to study and complete homework. Some students require more time, and some require less time.

Module layout

Day of the week	Module layout
Wednesday	homework is due
Thursday	Post discussion. Module discussion will open two weeks prior to their due date, and you may post early.
Friday	Two replies to another student's post in discussion.
Friday	A reading review quiz – based on the module Power Point, assigned reading and videos. They are 20 minutes long, you are able to take it twice and the average score will be kept. You can prepare by filling out the study guide. Quizzes open one day before the due date.

Assignments: Every week there will be a reading quiz, a homework assignment, a discussion and a short quiz or exam.

<u>Homework:</u> All homework assignments are open from the first day of the quarter and may be turned in at any time until the due date and time, see the calendar. Late assignments will not be accepted and there will be no make-up assignments. All homework assignments are checked for plagiarism. A match of 40% or more will result in a grade of zero.

<u>Discussions:</u> There are weekly discussions. Long discussions are worth 20 points: 16 for an original post and 4 points for replying to at least two students. Your original post must be 250 words (max of 500), with at least two citations. Replies don't require citations but should be thoughtful and at least two sentences. Short discussions are worth 10 points and should be between 50 to 100 words:8 for an original post and 2 replying to another student on day after the due date and time. Short discussions don't require you to post sources of information.

<u>Quizzes and Exams:</u> There will be one reading quiz per week on the assigned reading. I recommend you fill out the part of the study guide related to the reading as a way to prepare for the quiz and the exams.

In addition, there will be **two exams. The study guides for both are posted on the main canvas page.** Exam questions are multiple choice and short answer questions. You must take the exams during the scheduled time. No make-up exams will be given. If you miss an exam you will receive a grade of zero (0). Missing an exam will seriously affect your course grade.

Grading

Students with a grade below 60% will receive an F. Should you wish to get a W (withdraw) grade, you must withdraw from the class prior to the deadline. I cannot assign you a W, only you the student can initiate this grade.

I may add or delete an assignment, change the due date or I may change the point value for an assignment.
