Class Hours:

This course will have 52 class hours, including 32 lecture hours, professor 8 office hours, 8-hour TA discussion sessions, 4-hour review sessions.

Course Description:

The course is a survey of United States History from 1877 to the present.

This course explores the consequences of a federal victory in the Civil War and the incomplete reconstruction that followed in shaping the emergence of a distinctly American state and society. Some themes stressed include the rise and structure of corporate capitalism, the development of mass consumerism, the distinctiveness of the American South, and the politicization of social issues from Prohibition to desegregation to abortion. Throughout the semester, students will be introduced to the historian's craft. They will study what historians do, how they do it, and why.

We will read a survey e-text, with accompanying primary sources and materials designed to teach the historical analysis of chronology and primary evidence, and of visual, data, and geographical information. Class will be primarily lecture-based but will require student participation through discussion sessions with the Teaching Assistant. This is an upper division course and will require significant time, effort and thought from its students. You are ill-advised to take it unless you have the time and the will to work hard.
